New Leadership at the Montgomery County Police Department by Walt Houser

Summer 2024 signified a pivotal transition for the Montgomery County Police Department (MCPD) as Chief Marcus Jones departed after nearly four decades of dedicated service. Beginning July 1st, newly confirmed

Chief Mark Yamada assumed department leadership.

In his June 25, 2024, media briefing, County Executive Marc Elrich expressed profound gratitude for Chief Jones's steadfast service, particularly highlighting his adept navigation through numerous significant challenges. These challenges included the COVID-19 pandemic, protests following the murder of George Floyd, and the shooting at Magruder High School. Throughout these events, Chief Jones managed police staffing and recruitment hurdles affecting departments nationwide. His leadership facilitated significant strides in community trust, public safety improvements, and crucial reforms. His tenure has been marked by increased transparency and accountability, establishing a robust foundation for the department's future.

Chief Marcus Jones's Legacy

Chief Jones's career has been distinguished by his dedication to nurturing a police force that is not only efficient but also compassionate and attuned to the diverse needs of Montgomery County. He emphasized

his primary goal of leaving the department in a better state than he found it. Under his leadership, MCPD saw improvements in addressing crime, particularly with technological innovations and community engagement. His tenure is marked by:

Navigating the COVID-19 Pandemic: Implementing adaptive strategies to maintain public safety and departmental operations.

Chief Yamada's Vision and Challenges Ahead

Closing Remarks

County Executive Elrich concluded the briefing by thanking Chief Jones for his exemplary service and congratulating Chief Yamada on his well-deserved appointment. He expressed optimism for the department's future under Yamada's leadership and reaffirmed his commitment to addressing the community's critical issues.

Chief Jones and Chief Yamada then took the floor to share their perspectives on the transition and address questions from the media. They expressed their commitment to maintaining high public safety standards and continuing to build a strong, community-oriented police force in Montgomery County.

Q&A Session with Reporters

After the formal announcements, Chief Jones and Chief Yamada answered questions from the media, providing insights into the challenges faced by MCPD and their visions for the future.

Talia Velas, Univision DC:

Q: What have been some of the challenges you have faced, Mr. Marcus Jones, and what are some of the

new challenges that the new Chief will take on?

Chief Jones: "The challenges we've faced included growing crime issues like carjackings and large car meetups, which were exacerbated by the societal changes brought about by COVID-19. We've also dealt with staffing issues, a common problem for police departments nationwide. Despite these challenges, we've maintained response times and utilized technological advancements to enhance public safety. Staffing will continue to be a significant issue that Chief Yamada must address, and I am confident in his ability to build on the foundation we've laid."

Chief Yamada: "Building on what Chief Jones mentioned, I will inherit these challenges, particularly staffing. I will focus on enhancing our personnel policies, training, supervision, and oversight and maintaining transparency and accountability. Juvenile crime, both in terms of perpetrators and victims, is a rising concern that we must address in collaboration with other county agencies. Traffic safety, especially for vulnerable road users, remains a priority. We aim to expand our automated traffic enforcement program and enhance technology-driven initiatives."

Judith Hays, The Greater Olney News:

Q: What benefits has having the substation in the Olney community been?

Chief Yamada: "The Olney substation has been hugely beneficial. It reduces response times, provides higher visibility, and allows the community to engage directly with our officers. It is a crucial hub for our engagement efforts, reflecting our commitment to being closely woven into the community. The support from the Olney community has been tremendous, and this substation plays a vital role in our operations and community relations."

Farmer and Artist Market in Olney

Promoting Academy at local markets

Citizen Academy by Sergeant John Mullaney

Greetings to everyone from the Citizen Academy. I would like to thank you all for your dedication and hard work in supporting not only the officers of the department, but also the CA's recruiting efforts. I know Ken, Jacques, and several others have been manning a table at local public events to spread the word about what it is like to attend the course and the behind-the-scenes knowledge attendees walk away with. Session 74 just started, and I had 4 students join solely because of the positive interaction they had with the MCCAAA team at these events. So, keep up the good work and I hope to see you out at the event

table soon.

Session 74 just entered week 3 of the course and it is the first full session that Chief Marc Yamada gets to be involved with. In the first week, he was eager to share his vision for the department and the changes he is proposing to deal with an unprecedented recruiting issue for the sworn officers that answer our 9-1-1 calls for assistance.

We are currently down about 170 officers from our authorized strength and that is posing leadership challenges for the Chief to address immediately to ensure we recruit, train, and retain the best qualified applicants for our community. Our community expects and demands that from its police department.

Session 75 of the CA will begin 01/07/2025 and it will have a new block of instruction added to it detailing the Drone as a First Responder (DFR) program. The DFR program is organizationally housed within the Special Operations Division (SOD). MCPD SOD has been using Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) since 2020 for various missions to include tactical operations, crime scene mapping, search and rescue, etc.

The DFR program differs from the department's existing drone program. DFR involves prepositioning a larger drone on top of an elevated building on a landing pad. This drone, during operational hours, will be idling in a "ready status" on a landing pad. The DFR program utilizes this drone to fly to a call for service (911 or officer generated/requested) and arrive prior to, or in conjunction with, first responders on the ground. The DFR assists with helping evaluate the scene and circumstances before officers arrive and while an event is ongoing. DFR provides necessary tactical information and situational awareness to help officers safely respond to incidents, de-escalate situations, and increase efficiency.

The main goals of the DFR program are:

- Improve police response times.
- Allow MCPD to be more efficient with resources –
 DFR, in about 15% of current deployments, cancels the need for patrol to respond to an incident.
- Provide real time information to ground officers to allow for better decision making – DFR can assist with establishing perimeters, providing

additional information on potential hazards, recommended tactical positioning, etc.

- Assist with de-escalation of incidents DFR has assisted with whether subjects are armed or not, suspect location and officer positioning to allow for officer space/time/distance.
- Assist with locating and apprehending criminal suspects.

Montgomery County Public Safety Training Academy

Opened in the Fall of 2016, the Montgomery County Public Safety Training Academy is a state-of-the-art learning environment which provides training for Montgomery County Police, Montgomery County Fire & Rescue Services, Montgomery County Sheriffs, Gaithersburg City Police, Rockville City Police, Takoma track, skills and skid pan where recruits and current Park Police, Maryland National Capital Park Police -

Montgomery County Division, Montgomery County Fire Bomb & Explosives Investigators, Chevy Chase Village Police.

The Police Academy is housed on the 1st Floor of the main academic building and consists of administrative areas for staff, 9 classrooms (1 designated stadium style seating for up to 60 recruits,

1 - 20-person computer lab, 1 designated for instructional firearms) for annual in-service, first aid, taser and other specialized training. There is also a firearms simulator for shoot-don't-shoot scenarios, indoor fixed position and tactical firing ranges, defense tactics room, gymnasium, weight room, separate staff and recruit locker rooms for males and females (each locker room also has its own washer and dryer) and a multi-purpose room where recruits eat lunch, have morning inspections and can be used by the community at no charge.

The outdoor training venues on campus consist of 6 outbuildings referred to as the "CityScape" that provide scenario-based training and are set up as a single-family home, school, bank, retail store, apartment building and bank. There is also a driving officers learn skills for emergency vehicle operations

> (EVOC), also used for police motorcycle and large police vehicle training operations (command bus, emergency services unit trucks).

We are home to the police canine (K9) unit which has an 80,000 square foot fenced training area, kennels and administrative offices. There are also separate

training venues for Ride On bus operators and Montgomery County Fire Rescue Services (burn buildings, metro rail car and firehouse with bays for driving apparatus in/out).

We host a Police Citizen's Academy, Hispanic Community Academy and open our doors for other county divisions/sections that need training space. We also actively host International Police Agencies at the request of the US State Department and FBI.
